ABSTRACT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Notice provides the framework for a local emphasis program to reduce and/or eliminate hazards associated with logging in Oregon and Washington.

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- I. Purpose.** This Notice renews the policies and procedures to be followed when making local emphasis inspections of logging operations in Oregon and Washington that are under federal jurisdiction.
- II. Scope.** This Notice applies in Oregon and Washington to inspections by federal OSHA of sites under federal jurisdiction.

VII. Actions Required. The area director shall use the procedures described in this Notice when any logging operation is scheduled for a programmed safety and health inspection.

VIII. Background.

This LEP supports the DOL 2014-2018 Strategic Plan, Strategic Objective 2.1, to secure safe and healthy workplaces, particularly in high-risk industries. The responsibility for conducting safety and health inspections of most logging operations in Oregon and Washington belongs to the occupational safety and health programs operated by the states of Oregon and Washington under the OSHA Act. Those inspections are made according to state procedures approved by OSHA. The exception to this is all Indian reservations in both states plus Fort Lewis in Washington, which fall under the jurisdiction of federal OSHA.

There were no fatalities under OSHA’s jurisdiction during FY 2014 or in the previous three years in Oregon and Washington. Injury and illness statistical data from Washington does not specify incident rates in the logging industry (NAICS code 113, Forestry and Logging). Oregon’s incidence rates for the logging industry in 2012 show a TRC rate of 10.5 and a DART rate of 5.2. The Federal injury and illness rates for the logging industry show a TRC rate of 4.3 and a DART rate of 2.5 in 2012. This data indicates that loggers in Oregon sustain more than twice as many injuries and illnesses. Data for 2013 are not yet available.

IX. Policy.

The Portland and Bellevue area directors shall use the local emphasis program, as described in Appendix A, as the basis for scheduling programmed safety and health inspections in logging operations.

Referral inspections from safety or health compliance officers making inspections under this inspection program shall be made using the guidelines outlined in the FOM.

X. Procedures.

The procedures contained in this Notice shall be followed for the purpose of targeting and scheduling OSHA inspections in all logging operations in Oregon and Washington.

A. Outreach.

This LEP has been in place for ten years and outreach is a continual effort through programs such as Safety Fests and meetings with local industry organizations.

B. Specific Industry.

All establishments classified under NAICS 113310 - logging camps and logging contractors - will be considered eligible for programmed safety and health inspections under the system. Additional employers working at a selected logging work site will also be eligible for inspection if they are engaged in logging operation activity or if their employees are exposed to hazards related to those activities.

C. Procedure.

The following procedures will be used when targeting and scheduling logging inspections in Oregon and Washington.

D. Targeting.

1. The area director shall determine, a part of his/her yearly program plan, the number of logging inspections that will be conducted during the fiscal year.
2. The area director shall divide his/her jurisdiction into geographical areas to represent the primary areas of logging activity within the state.
3. The area director shall allocate the projected number of inspections to each geographical area.

E. Inspection Scheduling.

1. Compliance officers shall be directed into a pre-selected geographical area within the quarter as determined by the program plan or the office's scheduling system. The CSHO shall be instructed to inspect the first logging site he/she comes across. The compliance officer shall conduct a complete inspection of the work site.
2. If the area director has scheduled more than one logging inspection on a particular trip, the CSHO shall be instructed to continue his/her search in the region assigned. He/she shall then make a full investigation of the second logging site he finds. This will continue until the CSHO has conducted the

number of inspections assigned by the area director unless he/she is told to return to the area office or the area director assigns him/her a different work schedule.

3. The area director shall emphasize to the CSHO that a site shall be inspected once the compliance officer becomes aware of it. In no case shall a compliance officer be allowed to “cruise” looking for a particular employer or work site.

F. Unprogrammed Inspections.

Unprogrammed inspections (i.e., complaints, fatalities) will be made following current OSHA policy. Those work sites that receive an unprogrammed inspection shall be removed from the geographical area list for the year. Unprogrammed inspections should also be coded “LOGGING.”

XI. Special Instructions.

A. OIS Coding.

Inspections, unprogrammed activities and compliance assistance activities conducted under this program shall be coded with the designation "LOGGING."

B. Evaluation Procedures.

This LEP will be evaluated in accordance with the guidelines in Appendix A of CPL 04-00-001, Procedures for Approval of Local Emphasis Programs and Experimental Programs.

The Area Director will be asked to provide input concerning special problems that may have surfaced during the year; recommendations to improve the LEP; and recommendations to renew or not renew the LEP.

The Office of Federal and State Operations (FSO) shall review the input and prepare an evaluation to be submitted to the Regional Administrator for review by November 15 of each year. On the approval of the Regional Administrator, the evaluation report will be submitted to the Directorate of Enforcement Programs no later than November 30.
