I would like to invite you to join me in an initiative by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in which your building inspectors would work closely with OSHA to reduce the number of workplace fatalities on construction sites.

In construction, the four leading causes of worker deaths are: (1) falls; (2) electrocution; (3) being crushed or caught between objects; and (4) being struck by moving machinery or objects. OSHA's mission is to assure safe and healthful working conditions for working men and women in part by authorizing enforcement of the standards developed under the Occupational Safety and Health Act. I believe that workplace enforcement is not only our responsibility, but our moral obligation. Although we are adding 110 new compliance officers to OSHA this year, we simply cannot inspect every construction site in the country. We need your help to send our inspectors where they can make the biggest difference.

I am proposing that OSHA work with and train local building inspectors on the hazards associated with the four leading causes of workplace deaths and to notify OSHA when they observe, during the course of their building inspection work, these unsafe work conditions. For instance, if a building inspector on a construction site notices workers on scaffolding that lacks guardrails, he or she would report the situation to OSHA. OSHA in turn would send a compliance officer to that workplace for a safety inspection.

We have selected at least one city from each of OSHA's ten regions around the country to join us in this initiative. I would ask that you notify the head of your Building Inspection Department and advise him or her that the Area Director from the nearest OSHA Area Office will be in contact soon regarding this initiative.

Thank you for your time and interest in this initiative. I hope that you will join me in this effort to protect America's workers.


