WHEREAS, Every year thousands of workers are fatally injured nationally by workplace injuries and occupational diseases, and

WHEREAS, Thousands more are permanently disabled and even more are injured or made ill, and

WHEREAS, Omahans comprise a percentage of these occupational fatalities, injuries, and illnesses, and

WHEREAS, Concerned Americans are determined to prevent these tragedies by:

- Observing Workers Memorial Day on April 28, 2026, as a day to remember people who passed away on the job or were injured while working, and
- Renewing our efforts to build better understanding and training to create a safer workplace, and
- Rededicating ourselves to help American workplaces maintain a safe environment for their teammates, and

WHEREAS, The City of Omaha recognizes that the right to a safe and healthy workplace is a fundamental dignity for every laborer, and that through vigilance and advocacy, we can ensure every worker returns home to their family at the end of their shift.

Now Therefore, I John Ewing, Mayor of the City of Omaha, do hereby proclaim April 28, 2026 as

WORKERS MEMORIAL DAY

Urging all citizens to join in remembering those we have lost and to commit to making our city a leader in workplace safety and health.
